School Facility Conditions -- General Information

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional. To assist in this effort, the district uses a facility survey instrument developed by the State of California Office of Public School Construction. The results of this survey are included within this report. The results of this survey are available at the district office and on the internet at [mcs4kids.com](http://mcs4kids.com).

Martone School is fully gated for the safety and security of students and staff. Before and after school, administrators and staff members supervise the bus drop-off area as well as the parent drop off zones. Staff, parent volunteers, and Safety Patrol students wear identifying vests and monitor entry and exit points as well as student movement throughout campus and near the parking lot. Students are supervised as they safely cross the street at two intersections adjacent to the campus before and after school. Once school begins, all gates are locked and visitors must enter campus through the office. Parents, visitors, and volunteers are required to sign-in and out and wear a visitor sticker while on campus. At the end of the school day, administrators and staff supervise students as they exit the school. Loading and unloading zones are clearly marked and signs are posted as reminders to guests. The safety and security of the students, staff, and families at Martone is a top priority.

Below is more specific information on the condition of the school and the efforts made to ensure that students are provided with a clean, safe, and functional learning environment.

Age of School/Buildings:

This school has 30 classrooms, a cafeteria, library, pre-school, latchkey, headstart, staff room, and an administration office. The main campus was built in 1987. Additions were constructed in 1997 and in 1998. Thirty-two portable classrooms were constructed over the periods of 1987, 1997, 1998 and 2002. The school opened in 1987.

Maintenance and Repair:

District maintenance staff ensures that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good repair and working order are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used to ensure efficient service. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. The school facility is in overall good repair.

Cleaning Process and Schedule:

The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. A summary of these standards are available at the school office, or at the district office. The Principal works continually with the custodial staff to develop cleaning schedules to ensure a clean and safe school.

Deferred Maintenance: The District participated in the State School Deferred Maintenance Program, which provided flexible state matching funds to assist school districts with expenditures for major repair or replacement of existing school facilities components. State contributions to this Program ended in the 2012-13 school year. Deferred Maintenance typically includes paving, roofing, plumbing, heating, air conditioning, electrical systems, interior or exterior painting and floor systems. For the 2016-17 school year, the district budgeted \$0.69 million out of the District General Fund carry-over funds for deferred maintenance projects throughout the District. The District also has 1.28 million of carry-over funds in Fund 14 Deferred Maintenance Fund available for deferred maintenance projects throughout the District. Identified needed repairs are weighed against all other District site repairs and the most urgent repairs are addressed first.
