

In the following document, Hanover Research presents an overview of the results from the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) Survey administered to students, parents, and community members at Modesto City School District.



INTRODUCTION

In the following document, Hanover Research presents an overview of the results from the Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP) Survey administered to students, parents, and community members at Modesto City School District (Modesto City Schools) in the spring of 2017. In total, the analysis includes 1,718 English and Spanish responses, of which 1,322 are students, 316 are parents, and 80 are community members (Figure ES.1).

Hanover summarizes overall trends from the survey and presents figures for select fixed-response questions to illustrate the results. Whenever applicable, we present results by stakeholder group and only display the percentages of the top two most positive scales (e.g., "agree" and "strongly agree" together). For questions asked to all three respondent groups, the figures display the question wording for students. Note that certain figures denote an asterisk when we find statistically significant differences between stakeholder groups (i.e., community, parent, student). Further, responses of "Don't Know" or "Not Applicable" are excluded from the analysis.

An accompanying data supplement contains complete results, including comparisons across school level, survey version, and parents of children who receive special services, along with verbatim open-ended comments.

KEY FINDINGS

STUDENT ENGAGEMENT IN SCHOOL

Overall, students and parents at Modesto City Schools report strong feelings of student engagement. At least 80 percent of student and parent respondents agree that students come to class prepared, and are motivated to learn. Interestingly, community members are less likely to feel that students are engaged in school. For example, only 50 percent of community respondents feel that students come to class prepared (Figure 1.1).

PARENT INVOLVEMENT

- While 74 percent of responding parents indicate that their child's school encourages parental involvement, only 50 percent of parents feel they have the opportunity to participate in the decision-making process (Figure 1.2).

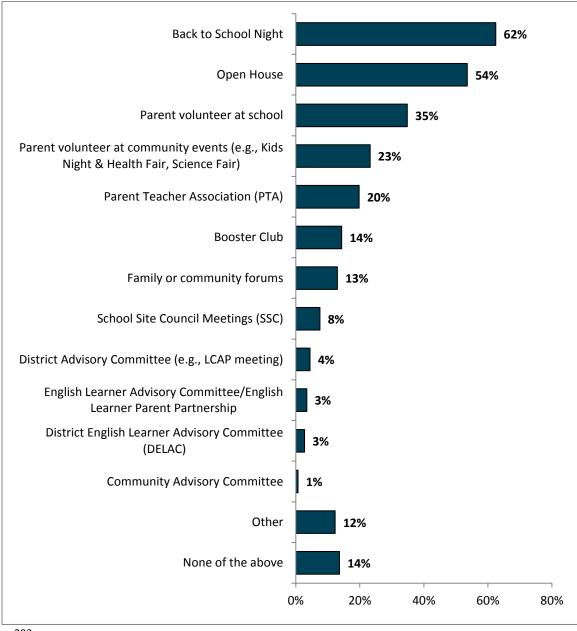
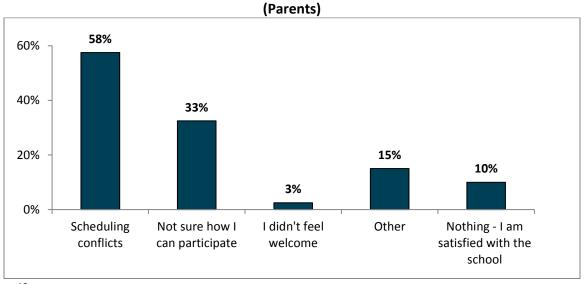


Figure 1.3: Which parent or community activity(ies) have you participated in this year? (Parents)

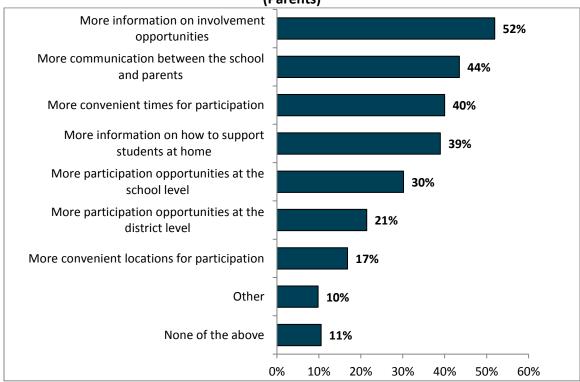
Figure 1.4: What has prevented you from participating in parent activities so far this year?

- Parents most often participate in Back to School Night (62%) or an open house (54%). Fourteen percent of respondents report that they have not participated in any activities so far this year (Figure 1.3). Of those that did not participate in any activities, 58 percent report that scheduling conflicts prevented them from participating (Figure 1.4). Parents suggest that more information on involvement opportunities (52%), more communication between parents and the school (44%), and more convenient times for participation (40%) would help parents become more involved (Figure 1.5).

COMMUNICATION

- A large majority of parents report that they are able to communicate with teachers or school administrators when they need to (88%) (Figure 1.6). Of the 9 percent of respondents that are not able to communicate with school staff, 69 percent state that the teachers/school administrators are unresponsive, and 46 percent share that the teachers/school administrators are unavailable during times that they are available (Figure 1.7). Parent respondents largely prefer to communicate with the school via email (79%), although more than half also prefer phone calls (56%) (Figure 1.8).

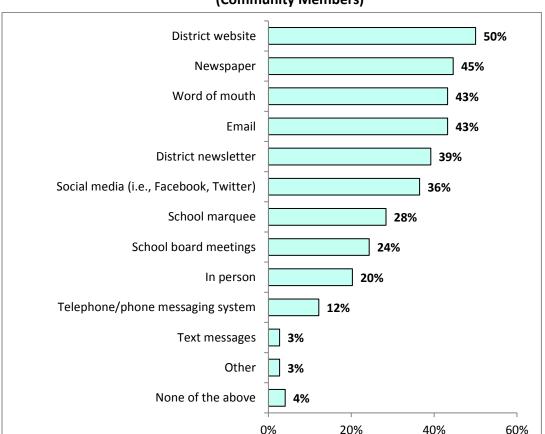


Figure 1.9: How do you receive information about Modesto City Schools?

- Half of community member respondents receive information about Modesto City Schools via the district website. Other common ways these respondents receive information is through the newspaper (45%), word of mouth (43%), and email (43%) (Figure 1.9).

SCHOOL AND DISTRICT CLIMATE

- A large majority of surveyed students, parents, and community members agree that the district wants students to succeed (76% to 84%), and that the district sets high expectations for student achievement (63% to 79%). While 66 percent of student respondents feel that Modesto City Schools provide sufficient opportunities to explore their career interests, only 41 percent of parents, and 46 percent of community members agree with this statement (Figure 1.10).
- In terms of school climate, over 70 percent of both parent and student respondents trust the teachers and school staff. Seventy-two percent of students also report that teachers at their school listen to them. Further, 65 percent of student respondents feel safe at school, although only a small percentage of respondents report that bullying is *not* a problem (Figure 1.11).

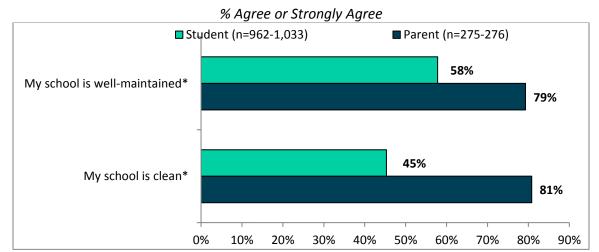
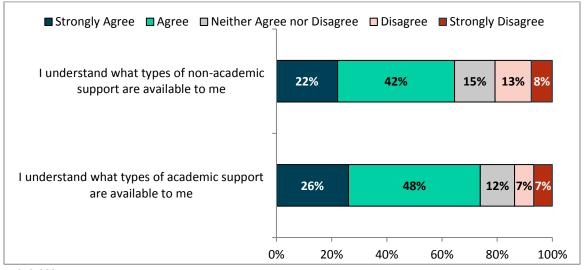


Figure 1.12: School Facilities

Although a large majority of parents agree that their school is well-maintained (79%) and clean (81%), only 58 and 45 percent of responding students feel similarly, respectively (Figure 1.12).

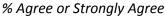
ACADEMICS AND SUPPORT

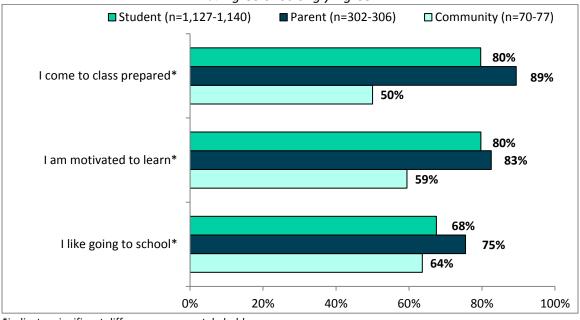

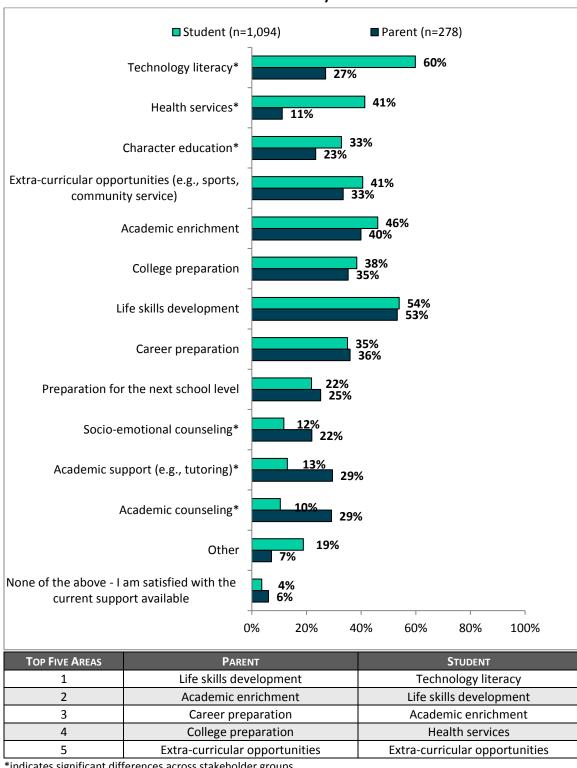


Figure 1.14: In what area(s) would you like to see more support available to you/your child at Modesto City Schools?

- Student respondents agree that they understand the types of academic (74%) and non-academic (65%) supports that are available to them (Figure 1.13). Students would commonly like to see additional areas of support in technology literacy (60%), life skills development (54%), academic enrichment (46%), health services (41%), and extracurriculars (41%). Parent respondents would also like additional support in life skills development (53%), academic enrichment (40%), and extracurricular opportunities (33%) for their child, but would also like career (36%) and college (35%) preparation support (Figure 1.14).

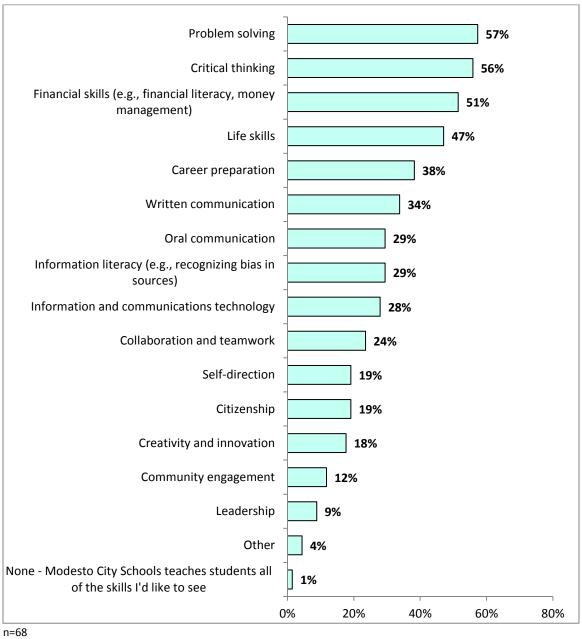


Figure 1.16: What skills would you like to see Modesto City Schools teach students? (Community Members)

- High school students most commonly suggest additional courses in foreign languages (45%), career and technical education (34%), and a college-preparatory elective (33%) (Figure 1.15). Community members would like the district to teach students about problem solving (57%), critical thinking (56%), and financial skills (51%) (Figure 1.16).

Figure 1.1: Student Engagement

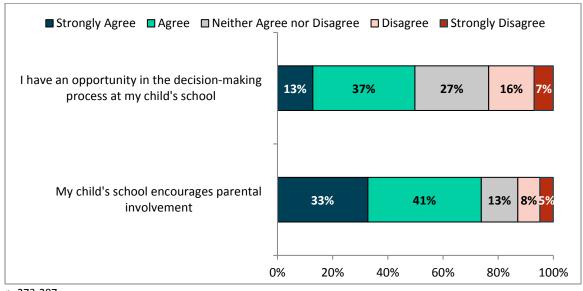

Figure 1.5: What would help parents become more involved in Modesto City Schools? (Parents)

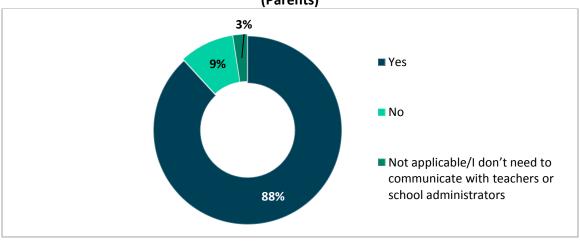

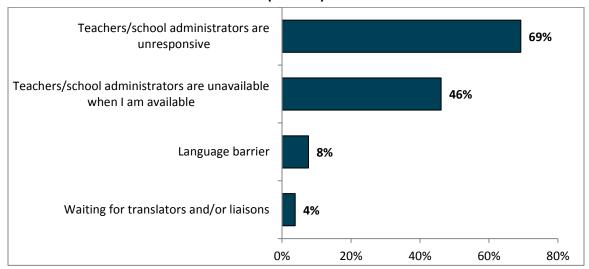

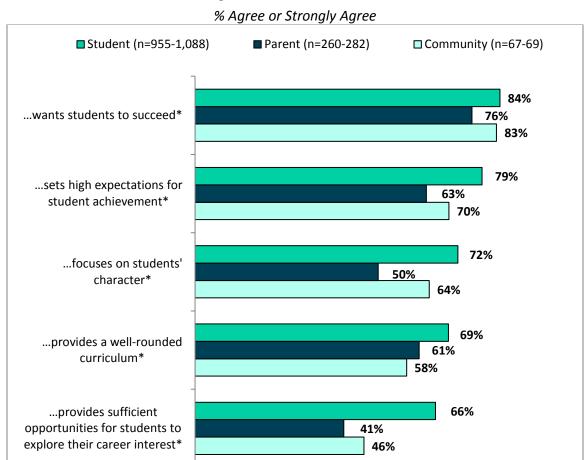

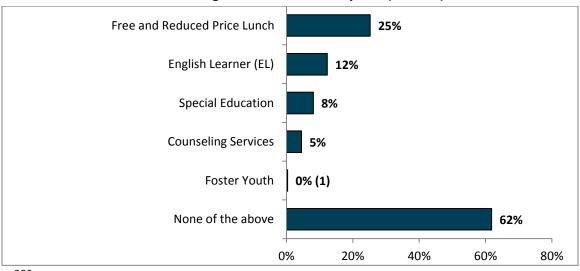

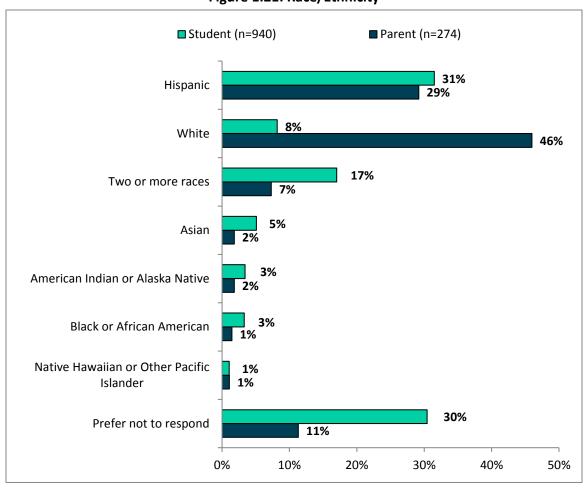


Figure 1.21: Race/Ethnicity
